## Closeout for M00020007

In February 2000, we received an allegation<sup>1</sup> that the PI<sup>2</sup> of an Small Business Innovative Research (SBIR) proposal<sup>3</sup> may have committed plagiarism. It was also alleged the research the PI had proposed was completed before NSF made the award. We do not believe the allegation of plagiarism is sustainable because the PI acknowledged the author<sup>4</sup> as having contributed to the project. Although it is still possible that administrative action may be taken, such as suspension of the PI's current SBIR Phase II award,<sup>5</sup> debarment, or a finding of misconduct in science, this investigation is converted to an I-case because of the presence of possible criminal/civil violations.
